Life Story:

Harry George Armstrong was born in South Australia in 1883. He fought in the Boer War as a young man and appears to have settled in York around 1909. In 1910, he married Alice Jane Hubble in York and their first child, Fredrick, was born that same year. The couple eventually had eight children. Alice's brother, John, also went on to serve in the First World War.

In 1914, Harry was elected councillor for the North Ward of the Shire of York, so he would have been a prominent member of the community.

Harry enlisted on the 5th April 1917 and reported to Blackboy Hill for training in June. His wife and children moved down to the metropolitan area soon after.

On the 30th October, Harry boarded the *Aeneas* bound for Devonport, England. He proceeded to France on the 6th March 1918 to serve with the 2nd Pioneer Battalion. However, on the 13th April, Harry became ill and was admitted to hospital. He was unable to re-join his unit until the 4th October 1918.

In March 1919, after the end of the War, Harry was transferred to the Graves Registration Detachment. The work done by the Graves Registration unit would have been particularly traumatising.

On the 16th August, Harry was detached from his unit to return to Australia. He finally arrived home on the 16th November 1919, more than a year after the War had ended. Harry returned to York where he remained with his family until the early 1920s. The family then moved to Victoria Park where they remained until Harry's death in 1962.
